**Grand Mutual Sdn Bhd** has commissioned Nesus Certification Sdn Bhd to conduct **Re-Certification** audit for its oil palm plantation, **Grand Mutual Sawai Estates**, according to MS 2530-3:2013 Part 3 General Principles for Oil Palm Plantations and Organized Smallholders.

# 1.1. Objective

The objective of this **Re-Certification** audit was to assess the oil palm plantation by an independent certification body with the aim for compliance of the standards.

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## **On-site Assessment**

The audit of the plantation was conducted according to the MS 2530-3:2013 Part 3 General Principles For Oil Palm Plantations And Organized Smallholders.

The methodology for objective evidence collection was through documentation review, monitoring data and site assessment. The audit evidence obtained was based on a sample of the information; thereby introducing an element of uncertainty. Checklists and questionnaires were used to guide the collection of information. The comments made by external stakeholders were taken into account in the assessment.

# Non-conformance:

On the basis of the desk review, evidences presented during the audits, non-conformance (NC) Major, Minor and Opportunities For Improvement (OFI) may be raised during the audit.

Major non-conformance shall be addressed and responded with 90 days from closing date of audit. For minor non-conformance and action plan to be submitted within 30 days from closing date of audit for review and acceptance. Implementation of Minor NC will be reviewed and verified during the next audit.

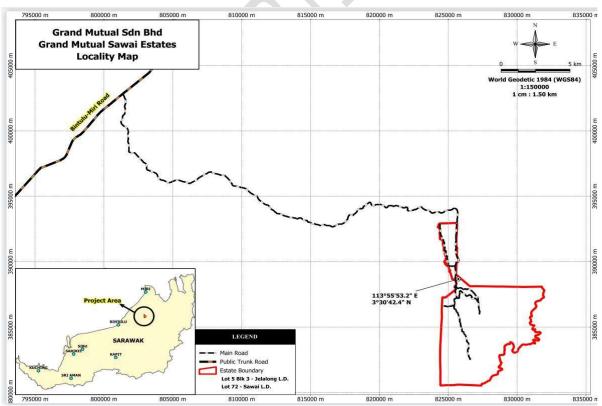

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# 4. AUDIT ASSESSMENT

### 4.1. Re-Certification

The objective of the audit is to assess whether the activities of the plantation are in compliance with MS 2530-3:2013 Part 3 General Principles For Oil Palm Plantations And Organized Smallholders.

### 4.1.1. Re-Certification

The Re-Certification audit was conducted on 10th January 2024.

During the **Re-Certification** audit, there were **0 Major, 0 Minor and 2 OFI findings** being raised. The non-conformance raised during the audit were closed out by means of documents review that were established, revised and implemented appropriately and preventive actions taken by the estate.

During this audit, the minor non-compliance raised in the previous annual surveillance audit has been reviewed by the audit team by means of inspection of estate activities by photos provided, conducted interviews, reviewed and verified documents that were established, corrected and implemented appropriately by the estate team. The corrective measures implemented were verified as appropriate.

### 4.2. Stakeholders' Consultation

at the notice board and implemented at this at the notice board and implemented at this estate. It was observed the safety policy was displayed at the site office, workshop and chemical store.

HIRARC Assessment has been done covering for various activities from operational and non-operational activities. The assessment was conducted on 03<sup>rd</sup> January 2024 by Mr. Alexander Rabu and approved by Mr. Hamzali Sisa. The HIRARC was reviewed on 03rd January 2024. By that, previous nc with regard to this issue was closed accordingly.

Annual training programme on safety and health for Year 2024 was made available, yet to be conducted. Based on the training record, it was observed that the Safety Operation was conducted in the estate which focused on workers' operation.

PPE issuance records were available during the audit.

Chemical Handling Procedure established dated 08/11/2023, Doc Ref GMS-03-SH06REV2. The policy explains on Chemical procurement, Chemical storage, Chemical procurement, Chemical storage, Transporting chemical, Chemical Handling

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and Chemical Spillage.

CHRA Report HQ/17/ASS/00/00013-2023/005 dated 27<sup>th</sup> October 2023 was sighted. Performed by assessor HQ/17/ASS/00/00013.

Medical surveillance performed for the sprayers, sampled Herman Lamatta the employee attended the medical surveillance on 26<sup>th</sup> September 2023, employee was found fit to work Medical Surveillance was performed by DOSH JKKPIH 127/171-1(324).

Safety and Health Committee Organization Chart was sighted, approved on 26<sup>th</sup> December 2023. Appointment letters for Occupational safety and Health Committee were sighted.

It is observed that management has conducted OSHE meeting on:
1)30<sup>th</sup> March 2023 (1st quarter 2023)
2)28<sup>th</sup> June 2023 (2nd quarter 2023)
3)30<sup>th</sup> October 2023 (3rd quarter 2023)

Emergency procedure was communicated to visitors. Sighted fire extinguisher and spill kit at various locations on site, for example SW store, diesel tank, workshop and office.

JKKP8 was sighted for the site, there was no accidents at the site.

**Employment conditions** 

The employment policy on good social practices regarding human rights in respect of industrial harmony was incorporated in MSPO Policy which consist of Safety & Health, Good Social Practices, Harassment & Violence Prevention and Environment.

Based on observation and interview session, it was noted that there are no discriminatory practices in the estate.

All employees are paid a basic salary that meets the state's legal requirement. Estate

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		also ensures that workers are paid based on the hours they work based on their checkroll.	
		Among other social benefits that were provided by the employer to employees, their families, or the community, are commission, bonus, medical care, and health provisions. The management also provides free housing, sport recreational facilities, a blue tank for storing treated water and electricity.	
		Estate established women's welfare committee as a platform for women to voice out any issue related to sexual harassment.	
		The estate management has no objection to the workers joining or forming some collective agreement forum as long as within the legal requirements.

Solar panels are installed in the office and workshop as secondary power source at night.

Waste management and disposal

The "Waste Management Plan" identifies and documents all waste products and pollution sources. The wastes identified were mostly general and scheduled wastes. It detailed the waste product, pollution sources, mitigation measures, target, and person in charge. Domestic waste from households, as well as empty chemical containers, were identified as wastés.

The estate's Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) for chemical handling covers hazardous chemicals as well as scheduled wastes.

A guideline for the triple rinse method is also available to assist with the management of used chemical containers prior to collection by a registered collector or to repurpose the containers, the containers will be marked X. Unused empty containers will be punctured and collected by registered collector.

Dumping pit for disposal of domestic waste is available and is adequately distanced from living quarters and water source.

**Reduction of pollution and emission**

Natural water resources
To ensure the quality and availability of natural water resources, the estate developed and implemented a Water Management Plan. Water quality monitoring is carried out through laboratory testing on a regular basis as part of the quarterly EMR.

Rain water harvesting is practised in the estate. The rain water is utilized non-consumable activities.

Riparian zones along streams/rivers are maintained to prevent water pollution.

Opportunity For Improvement (OFI) (Principle 4.5.5.1)
The Standard Operating Procedures (SOP) for the water treatment plant should be properly developed and made available at the water treatment itself. It would be useful for the water quality sampling and analysis to be done at the water intake point. This is not

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		only to ensure uninterrupted operation of the plant but also the safety of the treated water.
